



Tom Evans has been the Executive Presbyter of Greater Atlanta since February 2010. He previously served as Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Sheppards and Lapsley, headquartered in Birmingham, Alabama, where he was co-founder of the Alabama Faith Council working with churches of 25 traditions. In addition, he has served churches in Idaho Falls, Idaho; Magnolia, Arkansas and Buffalo, New York. He is the son of Brazilian missionaries, a graduate of The College of William and Mary, and holds both Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary, in Princeton, New Jersey. John R. Wimmer is a program director in the Religion Division of Lilly Endowment, Inc., an Indianapolis-based private philanthropic foundation created in 1937 by three members of the Lilly family. An ordained United Methodist minister, Wimmer was a parish pastor in Indiana as well as North Carolina for fifteen years. Marty and conducted historical research on philanthropy and Christian stewardship as they relate to congregational and religious life in America.

Steve Hayner is the president of Columbia Theological Seminary. He joined Columbia's faculty in 2003 and was the Peachtree Professor of Evangelism and Church Growth for six years prior to becoming president. Steve has been an ordained pastor in the Presbyterian Church (USA) for more than 36 years.

He has a degree in English literature from Whitman College, a M.T.S. degree in Semitic languages and literature from Harvard University, a Th.M. degree from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary, and a Ph.D. in Old Testament from University of St. Andrews, in Scotland.
